Jake NOTE: I am so sorry I can't be here – believe me I wanted to be (and tried, unsuccessfully) – please either read through the play as a group, or watch an online version, and try to work together – help each other out. There are only 6 questions again (and some extensions) – each question has been carefully chosen – you can answer it in a few sentences, or you could write a whole paragraph.

I will try to be here tomorrow but can't promise anything (really not feeling well today) – if not – finish these 6 questions by next Monday. **Next Monday we will do a BIG recap – go back through Acts 1,2,3** and try to make it familiar for anyone who is struggling with it – and then aim to 'wrap up' the Study by next Wednesday, **and start Year of Wonders next Thursday**. Don't worry – we will come back to it in Weeks 7 and 8 when we compare both of the texts in more depth.

Comprehension Questions (we can talk through these as we go)

- What happens when people seem to criticise the court's proceedings?
- What news do we learn about Rebecca Nurse?
- Why do Giles and Francis want to talk to Danforth?
- What two pieces of evidence are brought out against Proctor in regard to his Christian nature?
- What news does Danforth tell John Proctor about Elizabeth? What deal does he try to make with him?
- What paper did 91 people sign? What is going to happen to them?
- "...a person is either with this court or he must be counted against it, there be no road between." Explain the importance of Danforth's statement.
- What is Giles Corey's proof that Thomas Putnam is "reaching out for land."? Why won't he reveal his source?
- What happens to Giles Corey?
- What is Reverend Hale's advice as John Proctor is about to read his disposition before the court, regarding Mary Warren?
- Hawthorne thinks of a test for Mary. What is it? Can she do it? Why or why not?
- How does Abigail respond when she is asked whether she pretended to faint in church? Why?
- Proctor calls Abigail a whore, and he confesses his lechery. Why does he do that?
- Who is called to back up John's testimony? What happens?
- What do the girls do to Mary? What is her response?
- Why does Mary Warren reverse her position?
- What do you think John Proctor means when he says, "God is dead!"?
- What does Hale do when Proctor is arrested?
- Compare Reverend Hale now to how he was at the beginning of the play. Explain how he has changed?
- Explain Reverend Parris's motivation throughout this act.

1. Why is Reverend Parris so opposed to Danforth hearing Mary Warren's deposition?

<u>Extension 1</u>: How does Judge Hathorne's questioning of Martha Corey contrast with the duties and responsibilities of **democratic** court procedures (as opposed to this **theocratic** system)?

- 3. What do Judge Hathorne, Reverend Parris, and Thomas Putnam gain from the community's acceptance of the witch trials?
